Letter from the President

Each day, 45 children are diagnosed with cancer. Each day. For 45 families a day, their lives are up-ended and childhood will never be the same not for the patient, the siblings, nor the parents.

We believe kids shouldn't have to choose between life-saving treatment and normal childhood moments. So we bring the normal childhood moments to them, in the hospital. As we grow, we're constantly looking for more ways to serve the families in maintaining quality of life. This year saw some local expansion beyond our usual hospital visits and we're looking for ways to explore more of this growth.

Program Activity

We served **419 kids and teens** with our programs. Approximately 60% of our guests were girls, and 40% boys. We hosted **16 local chapters** in total. Four chapters paused activity due to the loss of the Local Chapter Director, and we gained five new chapters.

We returned to our roots- tiaras donated by actual beauty queens- with the help of our Nashville chapter hosting tiara drives and collecting over 200 tiaras for all chapters. This also saves us hundreds of dollars a year.

Young Ambassador Launch

2017 also saw the introduction of a pilot program for volunteers too young to attend hospital visits: Young Ambassadors. YA's are mentored by executive leadership and support the organization with local fundraising and supply drives. The goal of the program is to prime these individuals for community leadership and eventually local chapter directorship within For a Day.

This year, we worked with Kirsten Zeleny in California and Anna Horton in Georgia. These two young ladies collectively raised over \$1200 for For a Day.

As with each year, I'm humbled at the support of strangers who join this thing that started as a little tea party in Jackson, Mississippi. And I'm filled with hope for our future and a desire to keep finding ways to serve the kids and the families.

"As we colored with one of the kids, we overheard the parents appreciating our visit to the staff. They said their daughter hasn't been as cooperative in coming to her appointments lately, but when they found out there was a special event today, she was eager to get there. I was humbled to hear, yet again, how our presence was enough to make things just a tad easier on the kids and their parents. It's why we're here." - NYC

"One girl could not decide on which crown, so we had to try on several and let her look in the mirror. And another wore her ball dress to the event and loved spinning around with Miss TN USA." - Nashville

"Our favorite moment was when the father of our older teenage boy reluctantly agreed he'd get in the picture but he was not using photo props. His son said 'Oh, you have to!" so he grabbed a princess crown and bow! His son loved the picture and decided to decorate his frame with stickers he thought his mom would enjoy." - Pittsburgh

"We had been told by the grandmother that our particular patient had cried every single time that she had been to the hospital for treatment in the past and that this was the first time she hadn't, because she had been told that today she would get to be a princess." -Pittsburgh

"You could see how grateful the parents were to have a much welcome distraction and fun event for their child. It really makes it worth it to see the kids having fun and enjoying themselves in an otherwise very challenging situation." - Miami

"One little boy with a mask on came toward the end of the event, and was a bit shy. Within minutes, he stole the show, running around with the beach ball, dancing, singing, screaming and laughing. His shirt said "Be Fearless," and it was more than appropriate." - Southern MN

"After some princess stories, girl-talk and nail art, she was so excited to receive a tiara just like Queen Elsa's! She had the biggest smile on her face when she was crowned and said she is going to keep the crown on for a long time!" - Anchorage

"There was so much joy in the room - she kept cracking up with the volunteers, saying, "I'm laughing too hard!"" - DC

Anchorage Kendall Bautista
Kendall hosted a small party in March at
Children's Hospital at Providence Medical
Center, making 3 little girls Queen for a Day. She
stepped down to move to California.

Atlanta Katie Higgins In June, the chapter hosted a Character Brunch, where volunteers dressed up as storybook characters while serving a weekend meal to the families. This was the first event of this kind for the chapter and also for For a Day. In October, they hosted their annual Trunk or Treat, where families at the ATL Ronald McDonald House locations could dress up for Halloween and have a trick-or-treat experience. In December, they returned for the annual Winter Wonderland visit with Santa and Mrs. Claus. Every child in the house gets time with Santa and they receive toys of their choice. For some families with immune-sensitive kids, this is the only way they get to see Santa. In total, the chapter saw 31 girls and 29 boys.

Boston Sam Hawkins In March, the chapter saw 15 girls and 7 boys at Franciscan Children's Hospital. Sam then stepped down to move to Baltimore.

DC/Northern VA Liz Sites In February, the chapter saw 10 girls and 7 boys at Inova Fairfax Hospital. **Detroit** Nikki Follis
In May, we hosted our 10th annual Fashion Show at Carson's in Clinton Township. 17 local kids joined us for fashion, fun, and family!


Financial Statements

Below is the breakdown for all chapters combined with home office expenses. We carry one salary, for program-related investments in our volunteer leadership: training, encouraging program creativity, guidance on local relationships, & staying available to make volunteers as impactful and efficient as possible. The home office focuses on relationships and policies that benefit all chapters across the board. This includes taking inspiration from local chapters and expanding new ideas across the network.

The majority of our support comes from small donations from our local chapter network, as you can see from the list of donors on the previous page. Additionally, our Southern Minnesota chapter hosted its 3rd annual For a Day 5K in October and the home office hosted a "Treat It Forward" cocktail benefit in NYC in November. Corporate sponsorships were attached to these two events, as well as individual contributions above and beyond the previously acknowledged donations.

Also of note, volunteers have contributed over \$41,000 in time and professional services in 2017 alone.
